Founding Editor, *Cambridge History of Modern African Political Thought* (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press). This series is comprised of sixty chapters in two volumes. It is the first attempt to bring together senior and emerging scholars in the field of African intellectual history to outline earlier approaches in the study of African political thought, while simultaneously identifying emerging trends. Buganda: How an African Kingdom Changed Global Political Thought. Indian Ocean Slavery. Winston Churchill and socialism in the United Kingdom. British colonial policy in Africa. World Christianity. Indian nationalism. The creation of the state of Israel. Theodore Roosevelt and the Presidential election of 1912. Black history writing in the United States. The end of the First World War. Polish refugees during the Second World War. Religious studies. Modern psychology. What each of these subjects has in common is that their histories were transformed by the eastern African kingdom of Buganda. In this book, I use the international press and archives in Kenya, Uganda, Sudan, Egypt, Oman, Israel, India, the United Kingdom, and the United States to show how eastern Africans shaped global politics and knowledge production during an age of colonial empires. What emerges is a new story about how African state builders dealt with the legacies of eastern African slavery, while imagining future foreign policy and a world shaped by the power of Black kingdoms.

The Politics of Pageantry in Colonial Uganda. This article draws from private archives and Uganda newspapers to explore shifting conceptions of flags and the politics of colours in twentieth-century Uganda.
